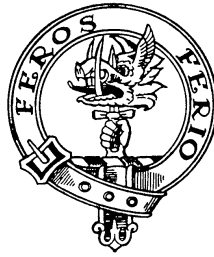
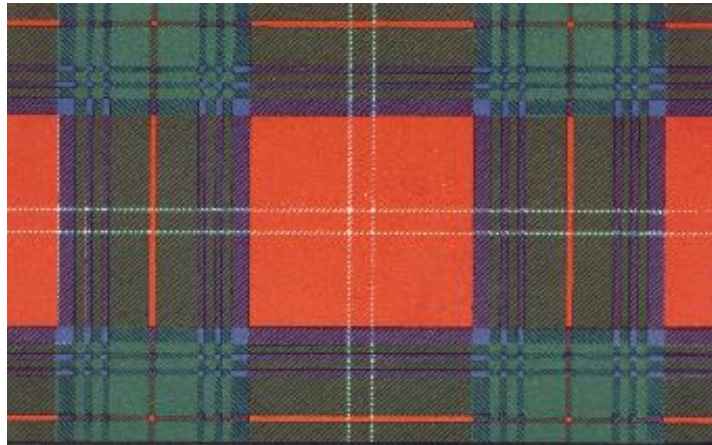

6c – AOB

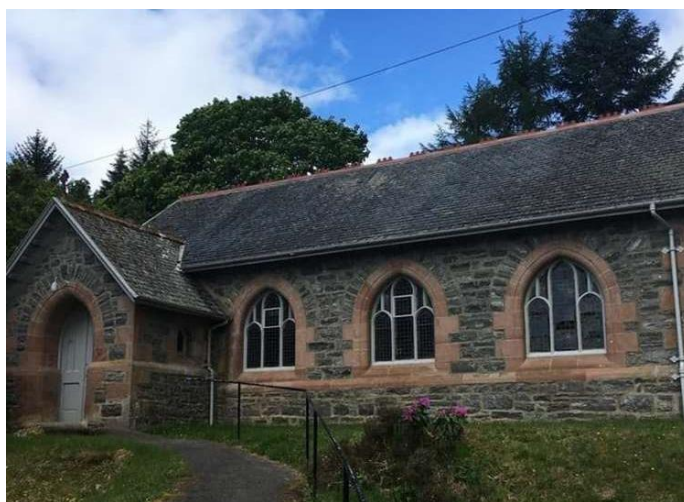

CHURCH TO BE A NEW HOUSE?

From Inverness Courier – 17 – 20 September 2021

A Highland church could be converted into a new home if the plans get the green light. Fiona McLachlan has applied to Highland Council to change the use of the disused **Cannich Church of Scotland** building. In addition the applicant is hoping to build an extension at the 760 square metre site. McLachlan has also applied for listed building consent – the Category C structure was originally listed in April 1986. A pulpit will be removed from the church and then be installed at Beauly Church of Scotland, which was a condition of the sale of the building. The applicant plans to install rooflights along the front and rear to maximise natural light. Advice will be sought from conservation specialists. The Church on the Glen Cannich road just above Cannich village has been unused for some years.



INVERNESS CRAIG DUNAIN RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

Inverness Craig Dunain Womens team recently reached the semi finals of the National Plate. The Captain is **Hannah Jane Chisholm** who plays at Centre position. GLEN AFFRIC – CAR PARKING

Inverness Courier – 24/09/21

The Highland Council Public Notices includes notice of an application to extend the Car Park and re-route a footpath at the Dog Falls Car Park in Glen Affric.

The planning application number is 21/04230/FUL and is made on behalf of Duncan Cameron of Forestry and Land Scotland, Balnain Office, Glenurquhart, Drumnadrochit, IV63 6TJ. It states - This project aims to deliver improvements at Dog Falls in terms of the site capacity for visitors, the quality of visitor access, the level of visitor safety and the overall quality of visitor experience. Specifically the project will increase the capacity of the existing carpark to accommodate 14 new spaces and improve traffic flow and also reroute a section of the Dog falls trail to improve visitor experience and safety by keeping visitors from walking on the public road.

HALF A MILLION ACRES SET TO BE 'REWILDED'

Half-a-million acres of the Scottish Highlands are set to be transformed, by letting nature take over. The area has been selected for rewilding, a process that allows land and oceans to return to a more natural - or wilder - state.

The huge **Affric Highlands** initiative is being run by the charity **Trees for Life**, along with 20 landowners and six organisations.

Work has also begun to involve local communities in the project, which is due to begin in 2023. The scheme will cover 500,000 acres of land and the project will last for 30 years in total and will see mountains, hills, glens and forests left to natural processes.



Affric Highlands will stretch from Loch Ness, across the central Highlands to Kintail in the west, and encompass glens Cannich, Affric, Moriston and Shiel.

It is hoped it will boost biodiversity and ecosystems in the area and help in the fight against climate change. Biodiversity is all the different kinds of life that can be found in a given area. That includes animals and plants, but also microorganisms such as bacteria. Each of these species and organisms work together in ecosystems. Ecosystems support all life on Earth. The healthier our ecosystems are, the healthier the planet - and its people. Rewilding is all about returning land and oceans to a more natural state. This often means doing nothing and letting nature take over to create more biodiverse areas. Not-for-profit organisation Rewilding Europe says rewilding is "about letting nature take care of itself, enabling natural processes to shape land and sea, repair damaged ecosystems and restore degraded landscapes." So unlike traditional conservation projects, the aim of rewilding is to create spaces where experts do not need to keep on looking after them and protecting the wildlife there in the future.

AIGAS FIELD CENTRE – WILD CAT KITTENS

Two wildcat kittens have been born at a centre near Beaulieu as part of a breeding project to save the species.

The new additions at Aigas Field Centre are the latest members of its conservation breeding programme which has been running since 2011.

A spokeswoman for the centre said: "We are overjoyed to announce the arrival of two wildcat kittens. The newest members of the Aigas Wildcat Conservation Breeding Programme will be joining the 10 adult cats that the field centre already hold. Through this difficult time, the arrival of the kittens has uplifted the staff and guests at the field centre. Our rangers and academic placement students have worked exceptionally hard to provide

our wildcats, through rain and shine, with an incredibly high standard of care. We are thrilled that their efforts have been rewarded by the birth of these two very happy and healthy kittens.

The two kittens were born to second-time mother, Brora, who gave birth to one male kitten, Beinn, last year. Beinn is due to be relocated to Devon to play his part in the nationwide breeding programme later this year.

"We believe the kittens to have been born around the end of June, with our first glimpses of the pair leaving their den box in the middle of July. Since then, the kittens have become more adventurous and have been seen out with mother, Brora, playing and suckling in the sunshine. We are currently waiting on confirmation of the sex of our kittens and will be naming them once we have received this information."

During their early stages of life, wildcat kittens have bright blue eyes which slowly turn to a yellow gold colour as they mature. Further to this, their coats change into adult pelage and they begin to look more like their parents. The kittens will develop the classic thick, blunt-ended, black-tipped tail, typical of a wildcat.

SILVER KILT PIN – ROYAL NATIONAL MÒD

15 year old Gairloch High School pupil Anndra Cumming has won the Solo Singing Fluent Boys aged 13 – 15 competition to take the An Comunn Gàidhealach Silver Kilt Pin Inverness. Anndra started singing around age six and his father is the Gaelic teacher at Gairloch High School. Anndra's older brother Eoin also sings and plays box and bagpipes.

The Royal National Mòd has appointed its new Bard, celebrated Gaelic poet Rody Gorman. Rody was born in Dublin and now lives on Skye and writes in Irish, Scottish Gaelic and English.

The Strathspey and Badenoch Herald reported on the opening concert at Eden Court, Inverness on 9th September and featured Duncan Chisholm playing fiddle for Anna Macleod, Gaelic singer. See below.

The return of The Gathering at the Northern Meeting Park in Inverness saw band Wolfstone playing. Duncan was a founder member of the traditional music band around 30 years ago and has gone on to a very successful solo career across the world. Duncan's Covid Ceilidh became hugely popular on-line and encouraged musicians around the world to upload acoustic tracks.

DORCHESTER CRIER EQUALS NATIONAL RECORD

Alistair Chisholm (76), Town Crier of Dorchester, on 16th October 2021 won the 68th National Town Criers' Championship in Hastings for a record-equalling 11th time. This equals the record held by the late Ben Johnson of Fowey in Cornwall who achieved this in 1973. Alistair said he was immensely proud to have equalled Ben's record, in what is the oldest and most prestigious of Town Crying competitions, and congratulated Andrew Fleming, the Town Crier of Swanage, on his well-deserved second place.

Alistair dedicated his win to all the staff at the Robert White Radiotherapy unit at Dorset County Hospital where he has recently completed his treatment for prostate cancer saying, "The staff are not only truly professional but are incredibly patient and understanding. The whole atmosphere created at the unit puts one at ease and the sessions are not only painless but pass very quickly."

Asked if he would enter the National Championships next year Alistair said, "I shall certainly be there as the Championship competition is only one part of a truly spectacular climax to "Hastings Week". I look forward to this annual event and love wandering around the Old Town. The Saturday evening's real torchlight procession, with its infectious drumming, is a sight and sound never to be forgotten and the accompanying huge beach bonfire and firework display more than equals anything I've ever seen." Will he try for a record-breaking 12th win?

"I am proud to represent Dorset's county town and will be giving it my best shot. Winning again would be a bonus but I know I'd enjoy the Hastings event regardless of the result."

****Does any member have a connection to Mrs Chisholm at Glen Brittle or have information on that family?**



Text from page – Mrs Chisolm's, (sic) Glenbrittle. This undated slide is interesting in that it records a house which was used from 1912 onwards by climbers as accommodation in the glen, before the Hostel and the British Mountaineering Club hut existed. It was also a Post Office, since there were several families at that time on the far side of the river, where today only ruins and holiday homes exist. There was a school also, to which the children in the picture would have gone.

NB. The Visitor Log book for Glen Brittle Post Office 1912 to 1980 is now held at the National Library of Scotland, Edinburgh.

Bualintur (Buaile an Todhair) is a remote township, which lies at the head of Loch Brittle on the island of Skye. Accessed only by the Glen Brittle footbridge. In recent history it was the central township of Glen Brittle, with the post office and school for the community. It was once a thriving community before the effects of the highland clearances and depopulation of the highlands and islands took place, and many ruined houses can be seen among the existing houses.

Dr John Chisholm CBE, Chairman of the British Medical Association (Britain's biggest doctors union) was in the news as the BMA dropped its 15 year opposition stance to 'assisted dying'. A slim majority of members voted to adopt a neutral stance on the difficult and highly contested issue.

John Chisholm is a GP from Berkshire and has been a member of the GP committee of the BMA since 1977 taking on various roles since then.

Currently Chair of the BMA Medical Ethics Committee and of the Men's Health Forum and an RCGP Trustee, he continues to practice as a GP.
